'Well Suited' Corner Card

Made with Stampin' Up! ® Stamps, Dies and DSP from the 'Well Suited' Suite Collection. Written and Photographed by Bronwyn Eastley, Independent Stampin' Up! ® Demonstrator, Australia.





Supplies -

Stamp Set: Handsomely Suited Card Stock: Basic Gray, Basic White

DSP: Well Suited

Ink: Memento Tuxedo Black

Dies: Suit & Tie, Pierced Blooms (label)

Other: Basic White Envelope

Tools and Adhesive: Paper Trimmer with scoring tool, Black Stampin' Dimensionals, Multipurpose Glue, Tear & Tape Adhesive, Mini Glue Dots, Bone Folder, Die-cutting Machine



Citting Measurements -

Card Base: Basic Gray Card Stock - (H)14.8cm × (W)21cm or (H)5-1/2" × (W)8-1/2".

Score along the width at 5.25cm, 10.5cm, 15.75cm or at 2-1/8", 4-1/4", 6-3/8" (all mountain folds).

Back Joining Strip: Basic Gray Card Stock – (H)14.8cm \times (W)2.6cm or (H)5–1/2" \times (W)1".

Score along the width at 1.3cm or $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Mountain Fold this score line.

Front DSP: (H)14.8cm \times (W)10.5cm or (H)5-1/2" \times (W)4-1/4".

Front Insert: Basic White Card Stock - (H)14.6cm × (W)10.3cm or (H)5-3/8" × (W)4-1/8".

Back Mats: Basic White Card Stock – (H)13.8cm \times (W)9.5cm **or** (H)5" \times (W)3-3/4". Cut piece vertically in half.

Tustructions -

- Cut and score card base as per instructions above.
- Die-cut a 'V' opening on the middle score line as shown, with the large 'V' shaped Suit & Tie Die.







- Die-cut a 'V' opening in the top, middle, front DSP piece using the same die.
- 4. Glue this DSP piece to the card base front as shown.

5. Die-cut a suit collar from the same DSP making sure the pin stripes line up. Glue to the card front. Don't put glue near the collar edges so they can be curled slightly for added dimension.

 Glue the front Basic White Card insert to the inside of the 'V' opening keeping glue away from the lower section of the opening as the tie will need to tuck into place.







 Turn the card to the inside and fold the Basic White Card insert along the lower-middle score line (below the front 'V').

- 8. Die-cut a shirt collar from a scrap of Basic White Card Stock. Glue to the card front as shown. Don't put glue near the collar edges so they can be curled slightly for added dimension.
- Die-cut the two tie pieces from a small piece of Navy patterned DSP. Glue the tie in place and attach the tie knot with a Black Stampin' Dimensional.
- 10. Die-cut a pocket opening from the DSP making sure that the stripes will line up on the suit front.
- 11. Using the edges of the shirt collar die, cut two triangles for a navy, patterned handkerchief. Glue these pieces to the back of the pocket opening, snipping off any excess navy DSP. Glue to the card front as shown.
- Die-cut three buttons from a scrap of Basic Gray DSP and attach along the lower-middle score line with Mini Glue Dots.







- 13. Attach some Tear & Tape Adhesive to both sides of the back, joining strip.
- 14. Attach this strip to the inside on both sides of the 'open' back pieces of cardstock, to join the card base together.



15. Glue on the Basic White Card Mats to the back of the card, leaving a small border around the outer edges.





Back Closure



- 16. Stamp a sentiment with Tuxedo Black Ink onto a small piece of Basic White Card Stock and cut out with a label die (I used the one from Pierced Blooms Dies).
- 17. Die-cut two bows from scraps of Basic White Card Stock. Fold both bows in half as shown.
- 18. With the fold of the bows, positioned along the middle-back, join line, glue the lower half of each bow to the back of the card as shown. This mechanism will allow the sentiment label to pivot on the corner of the card.
- 19. Add glue to the top halves of the bows and attach the label.

20. Die-cut a small pocket from a scrap of DSP. Add glue around the edges on the back (not along the top) and attach two Black Dimensionals.













21. Attach to the lower-left corner of the card back.

22. Optional: Attach a strip of Navy patterned DSP to the front of the envelope.

Your finished card will push down flat and fit inside a standard card size envelope.
